A Piece of History

GOLD

'On the 28th August 1863 reward or bonus of £1375 was offered to any party who shall discover a 'Workable Gold field in the Province', (Marlborough) Superintendent, Thomas Carter.

Easter 1964, Gold was discovered up the Wakamarina River, the miners went to Picton to claim the bonus-but others had gone to Nelson, and a Court case eventuated and the Gold Bonus was given to; Hiram Harris, Joshua and George Rutland and John Wilson.

In the early days of the rush, from 7.06.1864 to 7.09.1866 a total of 20,160 ounces was shipped from the ports of Havelock and Picton. Gold also went over the Maungatapu Track to Nelson which was not a safe way to travel. (Maungatapu Murderers which is another story).

In the year 1887-1888 there were 21 registered mines in Marlborough and 287 Claims. 54,974 ounces of gold worth £214,057 of gold had been exported.

Today the Gold Market is booming (17 July 2020) it is worth \$NZ2750.05 and \$US1797.77 which was going up as I was looking.

On the 15th May 2020 the price was the highest at \$NZ2935.36 and the lowest on June 8th was \$NZ2585 per ounce.

The site is My Gold New Zealand on Google. Very interesting.

When I was at primary school Mum and Dad were goldmining, up past Butchers Flat, and we had a wee whare up on the knob above. Dad was the second diver (after Tom Carpenter) and Marguerite and I had to boil the billy and make sure the fumes were not going down Dads breather hose. We got good a lighting fires with damp sticks. They got enough gold in one day when I was at college to buy a brand new Cortina Station Wagon (early 60's) We also went to Reefton BNZ to sell gold. Soon there were lots of divers looking for gold, and they got good gold as the old timers couldn't get to the bottom of the deep holes.
