broadcast the most recent weather forecast on: Channel 01, 05, 63, 65 and 66 at 0835, 1135 and 1735. Channels 01,05 or 66 are the closest for this area.

Maritime Radio

transmit the weather at 0533, 0733, 1033, 1333, 1733 and 2133 -

listen on Channel 16 for a general broadcast and then go to channel 67 for D'Urville.

Nelson Marine Radio

also transmit the weather forecast on channels 28 and 60 at 0810, 1310 and 1810.

Distress, Urgency and safety Calls....

Urgent calls that can be made using your VHF radio are:

Mayday - distress call

Seelonce Mayday - silence on all transmissions which interfere with distress Communications.

Pan Pan - urgent message concerning the safety of a ship or person.

Securite - important navigational or meteorological warning.

Mayday Procedure

Use only if in grave or imminent danger.

- 1. Select VHF Ch 16
- 2. MAYDAY MAYDAY MAYDAY
- 3. THIS IS (say the name of your vessel and call sign 3 times)
- 4. MAYDAY (name of your vessel and call sign)
- 5. Vessel's position in degrees and minutes of latitude and longitude or bearing and distance from a well known geographical feature.
- 6. Nature of distress and kind of assistance required.
- 7. Any other information that may assist rescuers number of persons on board, emergency details, description of vessel, liferaft, *EPIRB, cellphone number.
- 8. Allow a short period for shore station to reply.

If there is no response and you have an EPIRB, activate it. If contact is made with a shore station, inform the station that you have activated your EPIRB and do NOT turn it off until advised by the rescue authority.

You can use any number of means to communicate distress simultaneously. Distress alert by cellphone call: 111

* EPURB = Emergency Position Indicating Radio Beacon.





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Battle for our Birds. Beech Mast 2014

Heavy seeding in our native forests this year will drive high rodent and stoat numbers that prey on endangered birds. 'Battle for our Birds' is a predator control response to protect our native wildlife from predators.

PREDATOR PLAGUE C YCLE

A predator plague that will pose a serious threat to our endangered native wildlife is being predicted by scientists this autumn.

High levels of seed production ('mast') in our beech forests is expected to trigger a rodent and stoat explosion later this year. When seed supplies run out these predators will turn on endangered birds such as monous, kaka, kea, while and kiwi along with other at risk species like bats and land snails.

What is a forest or beech 'mast'?

Mast events are prolific flowering bursts among forest trees, like beech, over spring and summer. This flowering in turn leads to a bumper seed fall in the following autumn and the widely available seed on the forest floor drives a rapid increase in rat and stoat numbers. Rats and stoats both prey on native species and the surge in the predator population puts vulnerable natives species under extreme pressure, particularly during the spring when birds are nesting and raising chicks.



What animals are pests?



Mustelids:

Stoats ferrets and weasels, collectively known as

Mustelids, were introduced in the late 1800s in an unsuccessful attempt to control rabbits, which built to pest numbers on grazing land. Ferrets are generally found in the open country whereas stoats' (and in lower numbers weasels,) are found in bush areas, Stoats, agile climbers and aggressive killers, are the most damaging to the local wildlife– while they eat rats, they also feed on eggs and chicks of many birds, including kaka.

Possums:

Introduced in the mid 1880s from Australia for the fur trade, numbers quickly swelled and spread so that they are almost nationwide with estimates of up to 70 million. In the local beech forests they can strip away softer leaved plants like the mistletoe and five finger and they also eat eggs, chicks, threatened land snails and insects.

Rodents:

Polynesian Rats (Kiore) arrived as stowaways on oceangoing Maori waka. Captain James Cook's ship and the European sailing ships that followed brought ship rats, Norway rats and mice. Ship rats are particularly good

climbers. Rodents feed on flowers, fruits seeds, snails, insects and lizards, small birds and their eggs. In the beech forest rodents numbers increase rapidly, with the abundant food supply of a beech mast (heavy seeding).

Wasps:

German wasps arrived undetected in freight in WW11. The smaller but more aggressive common wasps arrived some time later and now dominate the honeydew beech forests where their numbers can build to extraordinary levels in summer. Wasps monopolise honeydew, robbing birds, insects and lizards of this vital food source. They also eat vast quantities of insect and will kill and eat young birds on the nest.

How to poison the nest.

Place a dessertspoonful of insecticide at the nest entrance after dark when the wasps have stopped flying. You can use a puffer bottle for this job. Worker wasps flying in and out will spread the powder into the nest and the colony usually dies within a day. If activity continues repeat the treatment until wasp activity ceases.

Rabbits & Hares:

Hares are distinguished from rabbits by being larger with longer ears usually tipped black, and being solitary by nature. They were released for hunting in the late 19th century. They intensively browse herbs and tussock mainly above the bush line. Rabbits and Hares are becoming more prevalent in the Opouri Valley and Tennyson Inlet area.

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Blue Cod Management Report From Beryl Archer

Marlborough Sounds Blue Cod Management Meeting – December 2013

The Marlborough Sounds Blue Cod Management Group (MSBCG) met with MPI on 4th December 2013 in Nelson to provide feedback on the current situation and to share information with MPI.

MPI reiterated that the Marlborough Sounds blue cod fishery is recognised as an important fishery for MPI and a high percentage of the non-commercial research budget goes into the BCO7 fishery.

In April 2013 members of the MSBCMG had met with MPI minister Nathan Guy to discuss the current situation and made the following 3 requests:

- Bring forward the next relative abundance survey planned for 2014 to 2013

- Address the 46% (2012-13) increase of commercial catch in statistical reporting area (17) which includes the Marlborough Sounds management Area.

- Remove the transiting rule

The relative abundance survey was bought forward to 2013 and is completed, the MPI science working group will review the data in February with members of the MSBCMG invited to attend. Members of the MSBCMG are to work on a series of questions and the format on how they would like to be able to review the survey data.

Commercial harvest of blue cod increased again for the 2012-13 fishing year in statistical reporting area 17 and the total harvest has increased by 55% since the fishery was initially closed in 2008-9. The 2012-13 fishing saw industry exceed the TACC of 70 tonnes. See table 1 below.

Blue Cod Management Report con't.

In response to the MSBCMG request the Minister has asked for more information to address the increasing commercial harvest of blue cod. MPI has worked with industry to get statistical area 17 to align with the Marlborough Sounds Management Area so more accurate harvest information can be gathered, this will be implemented in 2014.

Prior to the BCO regulations for recreational fisher being introduced it was estimated that recreational harvest in the Marlborough Sounds was 150 tonnes. Recently MPI conducted a large scale multi species survey which estimates the total recreational harvest in BCO 7 (that is the whole of fisheries management area 7) to be 76 tonnes.

Clearly recreational fishers have reduced their catch in an effort to rebuild this fishery and it is important that commercial fishers do not place the rebuild in jeopardy by continuing to increase their catch levels.

Information gathered by MPI from charter boat operators shows that of all blue cod landed less than 30% were retained for the 2013 year, what this means is 10 fish are being caught for every 3 blue cod that are retained on charter vessels.

We have no information on the split between oversized or undersized fish returned.

The MSBCMG have requested that the recreational regulations for blue cod in the Marlborough Sounds/Challenger East area be reviewed as part of the 2014 regulation review.



"The Rescue from Tawhitinui Island" Jeremy's Story

With days of strong westerly's over the Christmas holidays a case of cabin fever was relieved by motoring up to Tarakaipa Island (the island closest to Penzance) to sit in the leeward side to enjoy the peaceful shelter.

When it was time to head back to Penzance we decided to take the long way home around the top of the island to give the launch freezer a chance to chill down.



The reach between Tarakaipa and Tawhitinui Island (the island closest to Elaine Bay) was a mass of white caps and as we got closer to Tawhitinui it looked like the waves were crashing across the southern most point. Then I realized it wasn't waves but someone waving a large piece of tin-foil, so off we went to investigate.

My first thought was kayakers who had fallen out as we have seen that before, but when we got closer we could see it was only one person. With 40 odd knots of westerly the maneuvering of a single screw, 36 foot launch is fraught with danger. We managed to get close enough to tell the person to climb up on to a rocky outcrop so we could nose in. He had a split second to scramble over the bow before we were out of there. We asked him where his kayak was and were shocked to hear that he had swum to the island. And then doubly shocked to hear he had been there for 5 days.

His story went something like this...

He had left most of his travelling gear in Nelson and only brought with him the absolute basics (water bottle, knife, flint, tin foil survival blanket) that all fitted in a small waterproof bag. His friends had driven him to Elaine Bay where he had walked the track to Browns Bay. From there he had bush bashed to the eastern point closest to the island and then swam across. His plan was to spend a night on the island then swim back to the mainland, but the rough seas and high winds had put paid to that.

There weren't that many boats out, and those that did pass close enough, didn't see him waving. He had found a place where fresh water dripped, surviving on mussels and the odd weka.

He was getting a bit frantic by the time we rescued him. We have never seen a person devour a packet of chips and a nice cold beer faster.

We dropped him off at Elaine Bay and left him to hitch a ride back to Nelson.

When asked if he planned to do any more "adventure tourism" he replied with a definite "NO – next time he would stick to the track."

Thanks Jeremy Cooper for sharing your rescue adventure with us. For us all, there is a message here. NEVER take chances with the sea and the weather.
